Cut and paste using programs like InDesign, or Word; then publish it with the *Espresso Book Machine*. In a few days *your* book is in *your* hands!

It can be that easy and fast. If you want creative control over the publishing process and a larger share of potential profits, publishing at **I Street** is for you.

Not sure how to get started? Attend our *I Street: Info Session* on how to create a cover design, incorporate images, adhere to copyright laws, register an ISBN, and make the book print-ready. It's offered twice a month and it's free.

Soon, **I Street** will offer classes on writing, editing, and revision; design basics, book marketing and distribution. Our referral list of local editors and designers can assist you in any aspect of the book publishing business — including how to get your book distributed in bookstores, develop a marketing plan, arrange for publicity, book signings and other public appearances, make sure you're listed in all the right online places, and so on. Submission And Formatting Guidelines

For each project we ultimately need two PDF files; one for the Cover and one for the interior text (The Block). The Cover includes: back cover, front cover, and spine. The Block is all the rest.

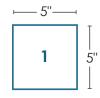

Size 1 Trim Size: 5" x 5"

Common Use:

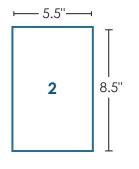
Small, square book, great for gift giving. A good choice for poetry books as well.



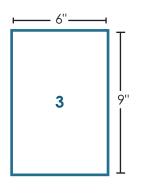
Size 2 Trim Size: 5.5" x 8.5"

Common Use:

A good option for journals and other general printing.



Size 3 Trim Size: 6" x 9"



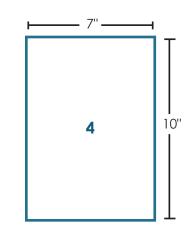
Common Use:

Trade paperback size, also called "quality paperbacks." Great for novels or other general printing.

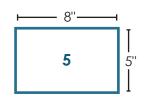
Size 4 Trim Size: 7" x 10"

Common Use:

Referred to as the "textbook size."
Many cookbooks and manuals use this size.

Common Use:

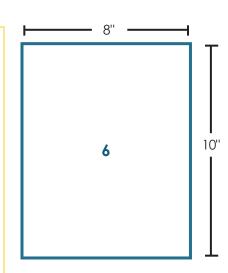
Landscape book great for comics or even black and white photo albums.

Size 6 Trim Size: 8" x 10"

Common Use:

Near Workbook size.

This is the largest size we print. Many how-to books or even magazines are printed at this size.



The Bookblock (The Block)

The **Block** is your content, the pages inside your book. The text, where you tell your story, arrange your recipes, combine your poetry into an anthology — whatever. It should include everything you want in your book — front matter, core text, back matter, images, and blank pages, all in one PDF. All books begin on a right hand page (Recto) and end on a left hand page. (Verso)

Paper and Color Options

Our books have satin-finish covers and white 28lb text (50-lb offset) paper. A cream 60-lb paper is also available. All our papers are book-store quality.

Content

The EBM prints black and white, double sided on 8.5" x 11" paper. Excess margins are trimmed during binding. The final page size of your Block PDF should MATCH the trim size for your book. For example, if your finished book is to be 5.5" x 8.5" then your PDF should also be 5.5" x 8.5". To print properly, your Block must adhere to these requirements.

Are margins set up the way you want them? Check that all text and images lie inside those margins. Headers and footers can lie outside the margins as long as they are still close enough to the margin lines to not cause a problem. Using images? Scan them at 300 DPI, the highest quality possible.

Determining Page Count

You will be charged a set-up fee, a per book rate and a per page rate which depends on the final count of your book. The final page count is the number of pages in your PDF document and includes everything — blank pages, dedications, table of contents, about the author, notes, bibliography, index, etc. Note that each sheet of paper has two sides, a front and back, and thus counts as two pages. To find your page count, open your PDF and open Tools/Page Count.

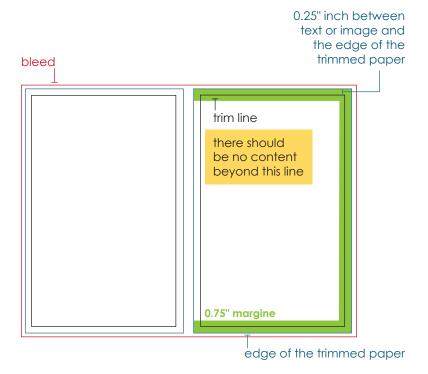

A Word on the Trim

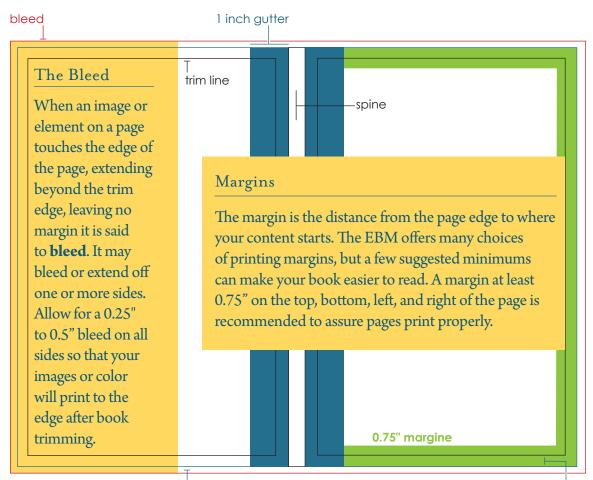
In the process of mechanical trimming it's natural for a cover to shift around slightly, the bleed allowance gives room for this shift, and is an industry standard. The trim is the small distance between the edge of your design and anything you don't want to be cut off. We recommend about a 0.25".



Most books have trim sizes between $5" \times 7"$ and $6" \times 9"$. Most fiction falls in the smaller ranges; most non-fiction falls in the larger ranges. Traditional trade paperbacks such as those on the shelves of your local library are $5.5" \times 8.5"$

When formatting for trim size, do not include crop or registration marks — the machine knows where to trim the book based on the files submitted. Books do not have to be any of the specific sizes listed; they can be any size between the minimum and maximum.

The maximum trim size for a book changes depending on page length. If your book is a hundred pages or more refer to the list to the left.

Tabs

Generally, tabs (used to indent paragraphs) are set between 0.25" and 0.5". Specify this distance under your Paragraph settings to ensure uniform indentations throughout your book.

The Gutter

An inadequate gutter is usually the hallmark of a poorly designed book. The gutter is the thing directly to the left of these words. It's the trough between two opened pages. It tends to make the inside margins — on the left side of odd-numbered pages and the right side of even-numbered pages — appear smaller. If you want your book to look like it came from a major publishing house make your inside margins .35".

In Microsoft WordTM this is fairly easy: from the format menu, select Document, and click on Margins; there is a value called "Gutter." Set to .35".

Line Spacing

Books usually use a setting between 1.15 and 1.25. Double-spaced lines are too large to read comfortably, single-spaced too cramped. The Paragraph Settings Panel lets you adjust this line spacing.

SETTING UP YOUR COVER PDF

Before you can create your cover you must know:

- The total number of interior book pages in your PDF, including blanks, front and back.
- The kind of text and paper you are using, and that paper's PPI. Our standard white paper is Xerox Expressions Elite 28lb laser, White PPI 432. Our cream paper at 24lb, has a PPI of 434.

Images

You must own the rights to, or have permission to use, any images included in your book. Images included in the block will print in black and white. If there is shading in the artwork (i.e. photographs or paintings) scan as Grayscale. Otherwise scan as line art. The higher the resolution the better it looks when printed. When saving images, make sure your original files are as large or larger than the size intended for the final document. Larger images scale down without quality loss, but enlarging an image may make it hard to view.

For best quality, images should be 300 dpi (dots per inch) and saved as .tiff files.

The Cover

Your book cover positions it in the marketplace, enticing readers to sample it and, hopefully, buy it. The cover layout and design is all up to you. However you like — a full-color illustration, two colors or even black and white. Only a few limitations to keep in mind. Nothing can be printed on the interior sides of the front or the back cover.

We recommend designing your cover using InDesign, even if the rest is in Word. If you haven't designed a book before we suggest you check a how-to book out of the library, take one of our classes or consult a professional designer.

Your cover is the back, plus the spine, plus the front of your book, centered vertically and horizontally in a landscape oriented 17" x 11" PDF document. It will be printed on a 17" x 11" (tabloid) sheet of coverstock, which will wrap around the printed bookblock and be trimmed to the book's trim size. No crop registration marks are necessary. Allow for a bleed of at least 0.25" on all sides.

Cover Margins

Keep at least a 0.5" margin around all sides of the document — keep all text and information within this border.

SETTING UP YOUR COVER PDF

- The cover must be centered both vertically and horizontally.
- Nothing can print on the interior side of the front or the back cover.
- Maximum dimensions of your cover image cannot exceed 10.75" x 16.75".
- A bleed of .5" should be around all sides of the cover image.

REMEMBER!

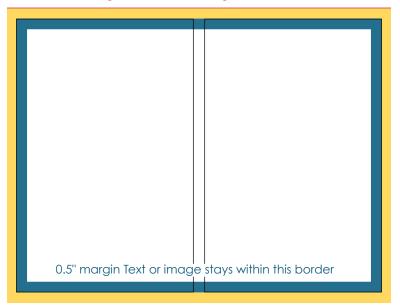
Complete the checklist on the following page before going to your appointment to ensure the most success.

Don't crowd the edges of the document — your file will print and look best when everything is kept within the margins.

The margin requirement doesn't pertain to graphical elements that you want to reach the final trimmed edges of your cover.

Create a 0.5" bleed around the document. Make your graphic elements (backgrounds, images, etc.) extend to this line. This is to ensure that no white borders appear surrounding your images and that the printed area goes from edge-to-edge of the cover.

Fonts

Make sure that the fonts used on the cover are easily read and properly aligned within the margins and the spine.

File Formatting

Files submitted for print **must** be in PDF form.

Color Settings

To ensure the most accurate reproduction when printing your cover, please make sure the PDF cover file you bring us is in CYMK color mode, not RGB. CYMK is meant specifically for printing, not computer screen display.

A CHECKLIST FOR SUCCESS!

- Proof read thoroughly, and review your layout carefully!
- Ensure that text and/or images are where you want them on each page.
- Use margins large enough to not crowd the page edges.
 Slight (unavoidable) variations in the trimming process might cut off words or images.

Over colors extend to the edge of the bleed. When using solid colors that extend to the edge of your covers make sure they go to the edge of the "bleed".

Every image is 300DPI and is saved as a TIFF.

☐ Fonts are easy to read.

Breaks in text are clearly distinguished. Bold, or use a slightly larger point size, for fonts indicating chapter titles, sections, etc.

Consistency throughout your layout (fonts, sizes, chapter headings, etc.) yields a more professional, and easy to read, final result.

Pages are numbered correctly. Odd page numbers on the right hand and even pages on the left.

You must have permission to use photos/ artwork or copyrighted text.

Calculating Your Spine Width

In order to have room to print on the spine of your book, it needs to be at least 100 pages. The width of your book's spine depends on the page count of your book and the paper thickness used to print your bookblock.

Use this simple formula

 $\frac{\text{Page Count}}{\text{Pages Per Inch (PPI)}} = \text{Spine width PPI}$

For example

 $\frac{\text{Page Count} = 250}{\text{PPI} = 432} = \frac{\text{Spine width PPI}}{\text{of 0.58 inches}}$

Our standard white paper has a PPI of 432

Please use as many numbers after the decimal point as possible. This will make the alignment of your cover much more precise.

Formatting Hints and Other Tips

Need a Bar Code?

Same thing. After you've obtained your numerical ISBN, that number can be used to create a barcode for your back cover. A barcode is a graphic of vertical lines that can be scanned for sales or inventory

To ISBN or Not to ISBN

If you plan sell your book through retail or distribution outlets you'll need an International Standard Book Number (ISBN). With this 13-digit number and a matching bar code your book can easily be added to any booksellers inventory.

If you aren't selling your book, are selling it through your own website, or through back-of-the-room talks, an ISBN is not necessary.

A single ISBN is \$125. ISBNs are also sold in blocks of 10 or more. A block of 10 cost \$250 and can be purchased from www.bowker.com.

We offer two options. If you provide your own ISBN we'll make a barcode for it and place it on your cover, for a small fee. Or, we can arrange for your ISBN number, Bar Code, Library of Congress Cataloging Number, and Copyright under our Premier Publishing Set-Up.

How to Copyright Your Book

To copyright your book, place a notice on the copyright page. Either the word copyright and/or the copyright symbol must appear along with the year of

Do You Need to Hire a Designer or Professional Copy-Editor?

If your objective is to create a book for friends and family you can produce something wonderful without investing a lot of time or money. Or, if you think you're going to sell 150 copies of your book or less (that's about the average) you most likely can't afford a book designer.

However, if your book has a complex layout, or you need it to look **totally** "pro", and indistinguishable from a book by a "real" publishing

first publication and the name of the copyright owner, such as "Copyright 2011, I Street Press, All rights reserved." You may then elaborate on the all rights reserved phrase if you wish. Check other books for accepted variations.

After your book is printed, you may register your copyright online (for a \$35 fee and two copies of your book, one if it is not for sale). Registering your work officially recognizes you as the copyright holder. Although recommended, it is not absolutely necessary to register your work. Copyright is secured automatically when the work is created. Registration strengthens your legal position. More information on this subject is available at www.copyright.gov.

How to get a Library of Congress Control Number

If you have created a publishing company we highly recommend you request a PCN (Preassigned Control Number) from the Library of Congress for your book. The number is then printed on the copyright page of your book, preceded by the phrase, Library of Congress Control Number. When the book is published, one complimentary copy is sent to the Library of Congress. This number allows libraries to catalog your work. For more information, guidelines about what books qualify, instructions and PCN forms, visit http://pcn.loc.gov. There are no fees for participating in the PCN program.

house, it's hard to get everything right, especially if you're a novice at book formatting. Hire a professional. Regardless, if you're serious about your book, no matter how many copies

you think you can sell or giveaway, get it copy-edited, either by a professional or a friend with excellent copy-editing skills. Look for someone who is experienced and will be upfront and honest with you.

If you choose to do your own formatting you need to know the following information.

PDF Document Formatting

When submitting your files for print, please format the PDF documents according to the following guidelines:

We really recommend that you use InDesign or another publishing software but if you do use Microsoft Word to create your PDF documents it requires a few steps. In order to create a PDF on your computer that is compatible with the EBM, you must have Adobe Reader installed. It is available as a free download. Visit: http://www.adobe.com/products/reader.html

The page size specified in your PDF file should be the same as the intended trim size for your final book. It is best to create your original document at this size — when typing your book or arranging your pages, set the document size to your intended trim size.

To do this, follow these steps:

- Click File
- Choose Page Setup and alter the page size to match your desired trim size.

You will need to save the PDF with the preset of "High Quality Print." This option is only available when you follow the "Print to PDF" option in Microsoft Word

We suggest opening your PDF documents on another computer to ensure they've exported correctly. Check for font accuracy, color accuracy, and graphical aspects. If these components, or any others, of your files seem to appear incorrect on another machine, it is very likely the document will print incorrectly on the EBM.

If the fonts are not embedded or graphics seem to be incorrect, return to the PDF exportation settings to ensure all fonts are embedded and the proper PDF standard has been selected (High Quality Print).

PRINTING TO PDF ON A MAC

- 1. Click File, then Print.
- 2. On the bottom left of the Print window is a PDF button. Click this to open a drop down menu.
- 3. Click "Save as Adobe PDF"
- Select "High Quality Print" from the list of available presets.

Permissions

If you use materials you did not create yourself you must secure permission to do so. This includes words and images from books, magazines, newspapers, and the Internet. Some sites appear to be "royalty free" but this is only true if you use that image for personal use. You should contact the individual, business or organization for rights. You may be asked to pay a royalty fee for its use. The price can vary depending on the material, the project it is used in and how many copies you intend to distribute.

Front Matter

Front matter comprises all pages before your book's core matter (the numbered pages full of content). Front matter generally includes your title page, copyright page, dedication, forward and may also contain a list of the figures, illustrations or tables in the book, a list of abbreviations, the frontispiece, list of contributors and endpapers.

This section does not necessarily require page numbers. Therefore, it may be easier to create this section as another document, (with the same specifications such as page size, fonts, formatting, etc.). You can then merge the front matter with the rest of your text (starting at page one) and turn the entire manuscript into a PDF file. Page numbers are difficult to manually format in programs such as InDesign. Using multiple documents lets you easily work around this problem.

Core Matter

The core matter is your book's content — the pages filled by your text. Generally, these pages are numbered. You can use the numbering feature to easily format them. It is best to keep them either centered on the page or aligned to the outside margin. Use a font for your page numbers that either matches your bookblock or complements it. Typically, numbers use the same font size (or just a bit smaller) as your content. Page 1 is usually the first page of content — it is the first page to the right of the spine facing you.

Chapters and Sections

You may wish to treat the beginning of your chapters or sections with modified formatting to set them apart from the rest of the text. Consider dropping the first line of each chapter 1/3 of the way down the page, or implement a drop cap for the first letter of the chapter's content. A drop cap will signify to the reader that this is clearly a new chapter/ section, easing the reading experience. Often, the title of the chapter is specially formatted with a different font. weight, and size.

Headers and Footers

You can place headers or footers on your pages to signify the chapter title, author, etc. Often, the left page shows the book title in the header and the right page shows the chapter title.

Back Matter

The back matter of your book comprises anything that comes after your core matter. This includes an epilogue, afterword, bibliography, appendix, notes, indexes, glossary, list of contributors, colophon, etc.

It is suggested that you format the back matter in the same way you formatted the front matter. This will, again, ensure a consistent and easy read.

Font Types and Families

Font Size

Books tend to use a font size between 10pts and 12 pts. These fonts are easy to read - but keep your audience in mind. If you believe your audience may prefer a larger size, use it. You could even decrease the size to a 9pt font. The smaller fonts are harder to read. The larger the font, the more uncomfortable it may be to read. Run a test page to test for readability before submitting your finalized file.

Using a variety of fonts can give your book character setting it apart from others. However, three should be enough for almost any book. Any more than this and your readers become confused or your pages will look busy and difficult to read. Check out books whose look and feel you like. In either the front or back of the book the designer will list the font used.

Serif

Serif fonts are much easier to read for long periods of time. The "caps" at the ends of each letter's stroke distinguish the font family. Examples of serif fonts we recommend can be seen below.

Text fonts are designed to set large amounts of text, like the pages in your book. Display faces, on the other hand, are designed to be seen in larger sizes. It's easy to tell a professional cover from one put together by a novice. The giveaway is usually the fonts. Make sure the fonts on your book cover are highly legible, meant for display and appropriate for the book you are publishing.

Our recommendation: Avoid Times New Roman. This typeface gets really old, really fast.

There are two basic font categories: serif and sans serif.

Winding your way through the POD world can be bewildering. Few of us can be a natural born editor, designer, and publicity department all rolled into one. Sure, you can type like no one else, you can use your cell phone to do cool things, and hey, once you even put a home video on YouTube. And, you've obviously finished an entire manuscript in a word processing program, but have you ever tried to design and layout an entire book? Do you know how to set your gutter margins or ever tried to create a PDF in Word? Do you have a copy of InDesign or other professional book design software, and if you do, do you know how to use it?

In a publishing house an entire staff is devoted to all of the technical stuff as well watching out for errors everywhere. Can you be that whole staff, spotting problems and fixing them as they occur? More than one indie publisher has proudly opened a box of books from the printer, only to notice right away that there's a big typo on the back cover. Damn.

It all seems so easy to do, and in some ways it is. But, be honest with yourself. Does your book look anything like a book from a publisher? If the answer is no, and if you want to do it right, there are some technical things you need to learn. Fortunately, we have professional editors and designers we can refer you to who can help you get through the process and make sure your book ends up looking

The Espresso Book Machine® (the "EBM"), is a book robot that prints, binds and trims bookstore quality paperbacks in minutes and can access a database of more than 3,000,000 books, many out of print or hard to find.

Create an original work, upload it to the machine or select a pre-existing title to print, and within a few minutes a book emerges, with a full-color cover, trimmed to an exact size and indistinguishable from the publisher's version.

The Espresso Book Machine is located on the 2nd floor of the Central Library, 828 I Street, Sacramento, California.

What are the specifications of a Books-on-Demand book?

What is the minimum and maximum numbers I can print at one time?

Print 1 copy, 10 copies, 100 copies or 300 copies or anywhere in between. The benefit of the Espresso Book Machine, though, is not having to print hundreds of copies at once and stacking them in the living room until they're ready to sell.

How long will it take to print my book?

The process only takes 4 to 5 minutes to print, bind and trim a book. However, set-up of the files may take longer and completing the full print run requires more time. Existing demand also influences delivery time. The Publishing Assistant will be able to provide a delivery date when you submit your files. We ask that you make an appointment with the Publishing Assistant when you are ready to print. We are not accepting walk-ins at this time.
